Message from Park Vista's Executive Director

Dear Lifelong Learners,

This semester is packed with great lectures, captivating speakers, and the excitement of the significant progress in the construction of its dedicated space, The Gelhaar Center. The center is on target for completion in April, and its adjoining sculpture garden should be ready for visitors in May. A dedication celebration will follow in the same month.

Park Vista has grown from its humble beginnings in 1947 when it served 12 residents in a renovated home on Youngstown's north side. Since its opening, Park Vista has served roughly three generations of Mahoning Valley residents who have created incredible and lasting legacies. Through their generosity and focused leadership, Park Vista has steadily grown. Today we provide a full continuum of care to roughly 300 residents alongside innovative services such the Mahoning Valley Lifelong Learning Institute, the Disease Support Network, the Rehab Center at Park Vista, and the technologically advanced Outpatient and Aquatic Therapy Center to over 1,600 Valley residents annually.

The Mahoning Valley Lifelong Learning Institute is a major part of our outreach in active aging services. Our donors have developed it from just an idea to a sustainable service in our Valley through their generous endowments. Their legacies will live on to serve future generations of older adults through the Harris Lecture Series on History and Political Science, the Gelhaar Lecture Series on Arts and Culture, and the Kyle Lecture Series on Religion and Spirituality all within the state-of-the-art Gelhaar Center. Made possible by Charlotte C. Gelhaar, this center houses charitably named areas such as the Kyle Classroom, Lamb Atrium, Neckerman Porch, and the one-of-a-kind Berlin Sculpture Garden. Additionally, the Gelhaar Center contains audio/visual equipment provided by the Schmutz family and landscaping provided by the Young family. Our donors — 84 in total — have given depth and differentiation to our Institute, and I am humbled by that.

I look forward to seeing you at our dedication in May, and sharing more about the legacies that serve the Institute and our campus.

In the late 1800s Hawaii was being transformed from an idyllic island kingdom into a bustling British colony. Hundreds of Asian immigrants were brought to the islands to assist in the transformation, working on plantations and constructing new houses. From this surge of newcomers erupted an epidemic of leprosy. Those afflicted were deported to the island of Molokai in order to contain the disease. It was a newly ordained priest from Belgium who volunteered and almost single-handedly cared for the lepers until he contracted and succumbed to the disease.

Dr. Eileen Campbell-Reed will present changes to the roles, leadership, and contributions of women in churches in North America. It wasn't until the 1960s that the American liturgical landscape saw a shift in this dynamic. In the last 50 years churches have experienced a dramatic and historical change with growing numbers of women entering into official pastoral and denominational leadership. The presentation will not only describe the changes, but also explore their meaning and significance.
